



Gov't: Encouraging Development

- DOT/NHTSA: 2016-2018 Federal Automated Vehicle Policies and 2020 policy:
- FDA: 2019 Proposed Regulatory Framework
- Trump Admin: 2019 Exec. Order No. 13,859
- OMB Memo: 2019 Guidance to Federal Regulatory Agencies
- FTC: 2020 guidance on avoiding consumer bias
- CPSC: 2020 Proposed Artificial Intelligence Forum



Courts: Adapting to New Risk

- Regulatory frameworks/guidelines/policies do not adequately address tort liability; courts left to adapt traditional common law/product liability schemes to new tech risks
- Wrongful death lawsuits Sz Hua Huang et al v. Tesla Inc. v. NHTSA 2018 determination in another case
- Rodgers v. Christie, 795 Fed. Appx. 878 (3rd Cir. March 2020) Al is not a "product" under the product liability statute
